Sally Hobart Alexander. *Mom Can't See Me*. A nine year-old girl from Pittsburgh, describes how her mom leads an active and rich life despite being blind.

Joan Bonsignore. *Stick out Your Tongue: Fantastic Facts, Features and Functions of Animal and Human Tongues*. Provides interesting facts about the unusual features of human and animal tongues.

Valerie Gladstone. *A Young Dancer: The Life of an Ailey Student*. Provides insight into the world of dance through the eyes of thirteen-year-old Iman Bright, a student at the prestigious Ailey School in New York City

Joseph Bruchac. *Dog People: Native Dog Stories*. Stories about the Abenaki people and the dogs who were their faithful friends.

Patricia Hermes. *The Wild Year: Joshua's Oregon Trail Diary*. Josh begins to settle in Oregon and hopes to go to school.

Eric A. Kimmel. *A Picture for Marc*. Loosely based on the childhood of Marc Chagall. Marc, an imaginative Russian boy, discovers his talent for drawing.

Emily Arnold McCully. *The Ballot Box Battle*. In 1880, young Cordelia goes to the polls of Tenafly, New Jersey with the elderly suffragist, Elizabeth Cady Stanton.

Marissa Moss. *Rachel's Journal: The Story of a Pioneer Girl*. Rachel chronicles her adventures traveling by covered wagon on the Oregon Trail in 1850.

Michael Tunnell. *Mailing May*. Based on the true story of young May who, in 1913, was sent parcel post by train to her grandmother's town when her parents could not afford an expensive train ticket.

Jonah Winter. *Steel Town*. Steel Town will be instantly recognized from the mills belching smoke to the Hot Metal Bridge across which the molten iron travels, and to the ornate churches and humble homes of the workers.
